FROGlife

The London Borough of Bexley was fortunate to work with Amphibian & Reptile Conservation (ARC) previously Frog Life, on their Living Water project that seeks to improve water habitats and awareness of their importance across London, to help support amphibians and other wildlife. Foots Cray Meadows was chosen as the site for the work to be done in Bexley Borough, and the Council and the Friends group have been working with Alex Drapper from ARC to develop suitable projects.

The project is funded by the Cory Ibstock Community Landfill Tax grant.

Why is this Important?

Old maps and local people's memories show that Foots Cray Meadows and the surrounding area once contained many more ponds and an extensive network of ditches, including a large central canal. Many of these features have since disappeared and now the only significant one is the old pond near Rectory lane, however, it is over shadowed by trees with little aquatic vegetation and it dries out in summer. Some of the old ditches still exist, but no longer hold water for any period of time. All this means that frogs, toads newts and lot of aquatic insects don't have suitable homes on the Meadows and their numbers are dropping. The same is true for grass snakes and lizards, which also benefit from these habitats.

Purpose and scope of project

The Living Water project's core objective for the Meadows is to enhance and restore any existing standing water habitat and create new habitat. The practical outputs of the project will be to:

- Enhance the existing old pond;
- Create new ponds and meadow areas,
- Restore old ditches if possible;

• Enhance land habitat for key species and the connections between sites -so animals can move between them; and increase capacity for local volunteers to help manage the new habitats.

Great crested newt (GCN), smooth newt, common frog, common toad, grass snake and slowworm have all been recorded at the Mead-



ows, but are now a rare sight. The prospects for continued survival of GCN on the Meadows is threatened by lack of breeding habitat. However, by restoring and creating new breeding ponds, wet scrapes and a revised grass management - to increase corridor connectivity- should all help the GCN flourish once more, as well as helping many other animals, insects and plants. This project will bring real benefits to the wild-life of the Meadows and the people that use it!

The Friends of Foots Cray Meadows are thrilled that ARC and Bexley Council have chosen Foots Cray Meadows as the London Borough of Bexley's primary site for a Frog Life project and we welcome the opportunity to join as partners in the project. The Friends will provide volunteers to undertake some of the initial ground work and planting to the ponds at Rectory lane and any new developments within the remit of the scheme.

The training by ARC of local's volunteers should take place at our centre using the IT equipment purchased from our Awards for All Funding. These facilities in turn give the Friends the capacity to continue with a pond awareness scheme after this programme finishes, enabling the Friends and Bexley Council to sustain the quality of these sites as an amphibian habitat in the years ahead..Look out for details as this project unfolds, all members will receive notification of opportunities to join in and regular updates of the project.

NORTH CRAY CHILDREN'S CENTRE and FFCM

Planned works on the Meadows

In addition to the tree planting on the west side of North Cray Woods on the 21st November, more tree works will take Place in North Cray Woods this winter, including:

- Sycamore removal along the northern woodland path,
- Another area of hazel will be coppiced; and last year's hazel coppice will have more small oaks, Ash and hazel planted.

In the late winter more trees will be planted in the newly cleared section of the Meadows near All Saints Church. Most of the old fencing here has been removed to open up this area for the pubic for the first time and to improve its appearance. The Alders Woodland down near Royal Park end of the River Cray will have more sycamore removed and new alder trees planted.

You may have noticed that the old yew hedge, at the top of the Lime Avenue, has received its second trim! These plants were originally kept as a 4' high hedge around the tennis court of Foots Cray Place, as you can see they were allowed to grow unchecked. The yews are now all level once more after work earlier this year to reduce their height could not be completed before the start of the birds nesting season, due to poor ground conditions.

This work will improve the condition of these old plants, as well as opening up the view across the Cray Valley from the site of Foots Cray Place.
